GREEKS IN THE NEWS

Calathes

The name Nick Calathes is a common name to Greeks around the world. His grandparents moved to Florida from the island of Lemnos. Twice named



Florida Mr. Basketball while in high school, Calathes proceeded to stay in-state for college and play for the Florida Gators for two seasons in 2008-2009. After two solid seasons in Gainesville, Calathes seemed destined for the NBA, but instead signed with Greek Basket League powerhouse Panathinaikos. In his first year there, he was a key contributor to the Trifylli's Greek League Championship. In the Euroleague's 2011 playoffs, Calathes emerged as a true star and helped lead Panathinaikos to the

Euroleague title with a win over Maccabi Tel Aviv.

Calathes then proceeded to win his second straight Greek League title, was an All Greek League First Team and Defensive Team, as well as being named Eurobasket's Most Improved Player of the Year. After spending one season in Russia for VTB United League team Lokomotiv Kuban Krasnodar, where he was named season MVP, Calathes finally returned to the USA, where he signed a one-year contract with the Memphis Grizzlies. A solid 2014 season in Memphis had Calathes ready to take the NBA by storm, but he tested positive for a drug-masking agent named Tamoxifen, though there was no evidence that Calathes ever took performance-enhancing drugs. Leaving a bitter taste in his mouth, Calathes left Memphis and rejoined Panathinaikos in 2015 for three years and \$7 million. He led Panathinaikos to two Greek Cup titles, as well as

the Greek League Championship in 2017. Calathes agreed to a contract extension with the Trifylli in 2018; but, last month, he was back in the news after the cancellation of the 2020 season when <u>he inked a new</u> <u>three-year deal with Spain</u> <u>powerhouse Barcelona.</u>



Bosgana

If you're not familiar yet with the name Elena Bosgana, you better get used to



it. The 17-year-old basketball prodigy has already been called up to the Greek National Team after averaging 19 points, eight rebounds and four assists in the FIBA U16 Women's European Championship. Bosgana will spend this season with the National Team before moving to the USA next season as a top recruit for the Stanford

Women's Basketball Team and Hall of Fame coach Tara VanDerveer. The poise of the 17-year-old left hander, as well as her versatility, will fit in perfectly in Palo Alto with only the WNBA in her sights.

Antetokounmpo

Reigning NBA Most Valuable Player Giannis Antetokounmpo is absolutely not one who needs an introduction. The middle son of five boys is a virtual lock to win his second straight MVP this season (-2400 to win), but right now he's more interested in his Milwaukee Bucks Eastern Conference First Round Playoff Series. His brothers, however, are starting to get noticed themselves. Older brother Thanasis is a teammate of Giannis in Milwaukee and, while Thanasis doesn't play a lot, he's getting more and more playing time. The youngest of the Antetokounmpo brothers, however, is starting to make a

name for himself in Europe. Seventeenyear-old Alex just signed a threeyear deal with Spanish club UCAM Murica. Alex turned down multiple offers to play college ball in the USA and instead decided to go professional in





Europe. This makes him eligible to be drafted by the NBA as soon as next summer.

While Alex absolutely has his eyes on joining his two brothers in the association, he's only 17, so even a three-year stretch in Europe would not be the worst thing for his development.

NBA Playoffs

Speaking of the Antetokounmpo brothers, Giannis and Thanasis' Milwaukee Bucks dropped game one of their First Round Series with the Orlando Magic before bouncing back and taking game two. At press time, the Bucks are 12point favorites to beat Orlando today and still sit at +333 to win the NBA Finals. The problem the Bucks have is that in the Eastern Conference, Boston (+1200) and defending champion Toronto (+900) both look hungry and ready. One of those two will be gone, though, by the time they meet Milwaukee, if they advance.

The Western Conference Playoffs tipped off with a bang last week, too, as both the Los Angeles favorites.....Lakers (+333) and Clippers (+250).....lost an early game.
